RATIONALE OF HDP NEXUS: THE DOUBLE BURDEN

2,2 billion lack
SAFE WATER (JMP, 2023)



3,4 billion lack SAFE SANITATION (JMP, 2023)


There is a **87% overlap** between vulnerable environment, Fragile contexts & extrema poverty (UNOCHA, 2022)

In fragile states, people are 4 times as likely to lack basic drinking water

In fragile states, people are 2 times as likely to lack basic sanitation




CONTEXTS OF APPLICATION (UNOCHA TRANSFORMATIVE AGENDA, 2012)

HDP CONCEPT: INTEGRATION & OBJECTIVES

It refers to the integration of humanitarian, development, and peacebuilding efforts to address the complex and interconnected challenges faced by communities in crisis-affected areas.

This approach recognizes that humanitarian needs, development goals, and peacebuilding objectives are interdependent and that a comprehensive response is required to achieve sustainable and lasting impact.

The approach aims to bridge the divide between humanitarian and development streams in protracted emergencies, using comparative advantages of humanitarian and development partners to transition smoothly from humanitarian action to development, fostering peace.



HDP CONCEPT: APPROACHES TO PEACE (UNDP)

UN & Multilateral actors

NGOs

Activities aimed at sustaining peace adopt different approaches, depending on the context and objectives.

'Big P' interventions directly target political solutions or securitized responses to violent conflict, often supported by a United Nations Security Council mandate. They may involve peace agreements.

Little p' actions are focused on empowering individuals and transforming social dynamics, building the capacity for peace and for conflict prevention and management within institutions and broader society. This includes building trust and social cohesion.

'Negative peace' signifies the absence of direct violence, like a ceasefire.

'Positive peace' involves resolving conflicts constructively, restoring positive relationships, and establishing a social system that meets everyone's needs.

39 Fragile, Conflict & Violent (FCV) contexts (15 very high & 24 high risk) make WASH Response critical for 2024



HDP RELATED OBJECTIVES IN ACF WASH STRATEGY 2021-2025

Focus WASH responses in areas with high public health risks

Implement WASH' Nutrition integrated projects to reduce acute malnutrition

Strengthen WASH surge capacity



Adopt accelerated procedures and tools for emergencies (e.g. SOPs, service providers framework agreements, procurement, resource allocation, emergency response fund)

Anticipate, mitigate and manage risks



Implement climate-proof WASH services (e.g. dyke blocking flood water, raised well, protect well with hand-pump)

Build strategic partnerships



Jointly assess the organizational capabilities of the country offices and local partner

Implement sustainable WASH services as early as possible



Conduct functionality surveys on online platform

Recovery

Use and strengthen local markets and social enterprises to provide affordable WASH goods



Build or strengthen social enterprises for WASH services (e.g. business planning, supply, marketing management capacity

Support civil society and empower communities to influence socio-political change in WASH



Support the creation of a feedback mechanism between communities and service providers

3 - BEST PRACTICES OF WASH HDP INTERVENTIONS



EXAMPLE OF GOOD PRACTICES TO ACHIEVE HDP NEXUS

Addressing the root causes of women's and minorities exclusion from conflict resolution.

Supporting the legal approach (water governance, basic services) to address the root causes of community tensions.

Learn on International Humanitarian Law

IWRM approaches & control of conflict over water resource access are a basis on HDP.

HDP approach presents challenges about neutrality and impartiality principles. It needs conflict analysis, the identification of entry points is essential.

Embedding livelihoods into humanitarian and peacebuilding programmes, and using multisectorial strategy to address root causes of crisis.

HDP benefits from multi-actors approach such as PPPs

HDP nexus benefits from localization leveraging local institutions, territorial presence and insights developed through bottom-up approaches



4 - CASE STUDIES OF ACF WASH HDPs



EXAMPLE OF JORDAN CASE STUDY ABOUT LONG TERM TRANSITION



10-year anniversary of the Azraq refugee camp in Jordan: | The Water Diplomat

Azrak Camp (Syrian Refugees):

- 41,000 People (61% children)
- 12 years
- Strong focus on humanitarian WASH
- Financial issues (donors fatigue)
- Promoting Behaviour Change Communication programs
- Addressing multi-sectoral approaches for social peace
- Working more broadly on water access in Irbid Governorate (contiguum & complementarity)
- Advocating on long term displacement funding issues



5 - POLITICAL & INSTITUTIONAL FACILITATING FRAMEWORKS



HDP INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORKS

It was defined as one of the 17 SDGs goals (SDG 16) in UNGA 2015.

It was defined as one of the 10 Grand Bargain goals (Goal 10, World Humanitarian Summit, Istanbul, May 2016).

European Union adopted the Nexus approach, recognizing the importance of building resilience and addressing the root causes of crises.

It is endorsed by the **Global WASH Cluster** as one of the 5 humanitarian outcomes of the Grand Bargain: "Mainstreaming the Humanitarian Agenda in SWA building blocks.

Other sectors, e.g. WHO, developed a for health in the HDP Nexus, which guides countries on the topic. specific HDP framework

Those frameworks implementation at country level are imbedded into Humanitarian Response Plans in FCV Contexts (see next slide)

EXAMPLE OF HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE PLAN

Strategic Objectives

S01

Save lives and alleviate suffering – i.e. emergency

That said, much more needs to be done. We need to recognize that humanitarian action only provides a palliative. It does not provide solutions. That can only come if combined with development and peacebuilding efforts.

SO2

Provide or facilitate protection for people affected by conflict and natural disasters in line with humanitarian and human rights law.

SO3

Transform affected people's lives so they become less dependent on humanitarian aid and have their basic needs met in a dignified way HDP Nexus often appears in Country Strategic Objectives of the FCV Humanitarian Response Plans (e. g. HRP Nigeria 2025).




6 - NEXUS FINANCING FACILITATING MECHANISMS FOR WASH



EXAMPLE OF FUNDING VARIABILITY FROM A CONTEXT TO ANOTHER










ADVANTAGE OF POOL FUNDED MECHANISMS TO FUND HDP NEXUS



Advantages of MPTF (UNDP):

- Flexibility (continuum, contiguum)
- Coherence (coordination of the various partners)
- Collective outcomes
- Managing risks (pool funds share the financial risk among actors)

Global Alliance to Spare Water from Armed Conflicts

The Global Alliance to Spare Water from Armed Conflicts galvanises efforts to protect the human dignity of the population affected from armed conflicts. The alliance will disseminate existing legal and technical tools for the protection of freshwater and related installations from armed conflicts.




